Until 2007, Elina Petrova lived in Ukraine and worked in engineering management. She has many Russian and Ukrainian publication credits, and a book of Russian-language poems. Elina now works in a Houston law firm. Her poetry has been published in *Texas Review*, *Texas* Poetry Calendars, FreeFall (Canada), Voices de la Luna, Harbinger Asylum, Illya's Honey, Melancholy Hyperbole, Panoply, the anthologies of the Houston and Austin poetry festivals, "Untamable City" by Mutabilis Press, and "Southwest Persona" by Dos Gatos Press. She's a frequent reader at Rice Gallery's "Words & Art." Her first book of poetry in English, "*Aching Miracle*," had been released in September 2015.

Everyone was a winged child. Everyone is ... This is my neighborhood: middle-aged, neatly mowed, no more anticipations — anxious doves at pink-ash dawns. Flatland.

Each day is the future — firm fresh fruit I make juice, pour into your glass on the glass table with a familiar sunray trembling. October air is brisk, intense. Judgments are softer, passions — tender, detached: embrace too much to claim possessions. Fairy tales ... Maples in flame send firebirds. Fire, what have I done to you?

- •Submit 1–3 poems in a single document, each poem on a separate page. Do not submit more than one time.
- •35-line limit per poem, including title and spaces.
- •We highly recommend that you submit at least one short poem 10 lines or less, including title and spaces. We welcome haiku, tanka, and other short forms.
- •We prefer poems with a Texas connection.
- •We strongly prefer titled poems except for haiku.
- •Include a bio of 60–100 words providing specific information about your writing life and your previous publishing credits.
- •Acceptance for publication conveys First North American Serial Rights, first-print publication rights, and the right to post work accepted for publication on the Dos Gatos Press website. Rights revert to the author upon publication. Payment is one contributor's copy of the calendar
