I've written about the pleasures of poetry that offer us vivid scenes but which lets us draw our own conclusions about the implications of what we're being shown. The poet can steer us a little by the selection of details, but a lot of the effect of the poem is in what is not said, in what we deduce. Lee McCarthy is a California poet, and here is something seen from across the street, something quite ordinary yet packed with life.

**There's a woman kissing a cowboy
across the street. His eight-year-old son
watches from the bus stop bench.**

**She's really planting one on him,
his Stetson in danger.**

It must have been some weekend.

**Seeing no room in that embrace for himself,
the boy measures his future, legs
straight out in front of him.**

**Both hands hold onto a suitcase handle,
thin arms ready to prove themselves.**

Guest Speaker: Gilbert Benton, poet, and educator, teaches at Alvin Community College. The college sponsors a Writing Workshop every April and a Poetry Workshop every Fall. One of the points he mentioned was knowing your market; another was that anyone can start a poem, but it takes a real craftsman to end a poem. He also read some of his wonderful poetry to us. If there had been more time, he would also have played his guitar.

The Meeting adjourned at 12:16 pm. Many members and a few guests attended lunch at Zios with our guest speaker, and brought poems for the Read Around.

February Speaker Steven Fromholz

Steven Fromholz was born in Temple, Texas in 1945. Most people know him as a singer and songwriter. As a child, he had polio, which affected his arms, so his parents gave him guitar lessons. The State of Texas named in Poet Laureate in 2007. Fromholz began performing while he was serving in the Navy.



Afterwards, he teamed with Dan McCrimmon to create the group Frummox and he also played with Stephen Stills and Rick Roberts before going solo. In 2003, Fromholz suffered a stroke while visiting his sister in Bosque County, Texas, requiring a three-year hiatus, as he says, "to reinvent myself." During that time, he again learned to walk, talk, play guitar, sing and adjust. Today, embracing a more user friendly schedule, he's writing new tunes, establishing new guitar styles and has returned to performing. Over the years, many respected musicians have recorded songs written by Fromholz. Most notable among these are Willie Nelson, Lyle Lovett, John Denver and Jerry Jeff Walker. In addition to singing and songwriting, Fromholz has dabbled in acting, playwriting, poetry, record producing, narrating, advertising jingle-writing and white-water river guiding. He is always approachable, unorthodox, outrageous, and truthful.
